#### Volunteer Role Description

#### **Volunteer Activity Buddy**

#### What is this role?

We're looking for volunteers who would like the opportunity to get involved in a wide range of outdoor and seasonal activities and support us to run our farmbased programmes, helping adults with learning disabilities to thrive.

Farmability activities are led by paid staff called Programme Leaders, supported by a team of volunteers. In this volunteer role you will help Programme Leaders to run activities.

#### Why do we need you?

Having extra support during activities makes a huge difference to our co-farmers. Co-farmers are adults with learning disabilities, some of whom are also autistic, who attend our farm-based day service.

Support from volunteers helps co-farmers feel included and get the most out of being at the farm. It also allows us to offer places to more people who would love to come to FarmAbility and are currently on our waiting list.

## What will I be doing?

- You will support programme leaders to deliver a range of activities and sessions to co-farmers – including gardening, woodwork, natural crafts, and egg collecting
- You may help to run games and other entertainment for our co-farmers at lunch and breaktimes
- You will help Programme Leaders to support our co-farmers and make sure their needs are met, adapting activities to make them accessible (for example, breaking down instructions into manageable steps.)

All volunteers accepted onto this role will be required to complete an Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check.

# What time commitment will I be making?

#### Our full day runs from 10am to 4pm.

We hope volunteers will be able to commit to at least one half day a week (with some flexibility.)

You can also volunteer for a full day if you would like to.

We ask our volunteers who support our co-farmers to come on a regular day. Coming on a regular day means that you get to know our co-farmers, and they get to know you.

We hope that you will volunteer with FarmAbility for at least 6 months.

## What training and support will I get?

- You will receive an induction from FarmAbility covering learning disability, autism, how to work with co-farmers, and more.
- You will be invited to team training and days throughout the year, where you will have the chance to learn and share knowledge (and good food!) alongside FarmAbility staff.
- You will be offered access to outdoor first aid training, training in communicating with people with learning disabilities, and more.
- You will benefit from regular check-ins with your staff contact. Day-to-day support will be available from any member of staff.
- There will be opportunities for growth and additional responsibilities.

	If there is a particular activity or project you would like to develop, we are very open to this and will help you to do this.
Accessibility Information	Some of our sites are more accessible to wheelchair users and people with impaired mobility than others.
	<ul> <li>Our site in Wytham has a disabled toilet and level access throughout our main buildings, as well as parking within a few metres of our main room. Access around the farm site itself varies.</li> </ul>
	Our different sites vary in terms of other access features.
	Please discuss with us if you have specific access needs (these could be physical needs or other needs such as sensory or information needs) and we will try and place you on the best site for your needs.
	We are committed to providing reasonable adjustments to allow disabled people to be part of our team. You are very welcome to let us know when applying if there is anything we can do to make this opportunity more accessible to you (for example, providing more regular breaks, ensuring you don't carry out heavy lifting, providing information in an alternative format.)
Location	One of our farm sites across Oxfordshire. We will match you to a site based on where you can travel to and the days of the week you are available to volunteer.
	Our farm locations include: The Blenheim Estate, Wytham, Long Hanborough, Oxford City, near Chipping Norton, near Thame, and Hampton Gay near Kidlington.
